Older Americans Act — Update

The reauthorization of the Older Americans Act (OAA), currently pending approval in the House of Representatives, includes provisions that could have a significant impact on deaf seniors. Here's how:

Enhanced Access to Services

The reauthorization proposes increased funding for programs such as caregiver support, nutrition assistance, and preventive health services. For deaf seniors, these services can be better tailored to address communication barriers and accessibility challenges, ensuring equitable participation.

Potential Impacts:

- Accessible Nutrition Programs: Meal programs could include staff trained in sign language or offer communication access via video remote interpreting (VRI).
- Transportation Services: Improved funding may lead to greater availability of accessible transportation options, particularly those that incorporate visual or text-based notifications for deaf individuals.

Inclusion of Communication Accessibility

The OAA emphasizes equity and inclusion, which may lead to expanded requirements for accommodations under federally funded programs. This could include:

 Increased Use of ASL Interpreters: Programs for deaf seniors could offer interpreting services during activities or health consultations. Accessible Technologies: Expanded access to captioning services, hearing assistive technologies, and communication devices for group settings.

Support for Caregivers of Deaf Seniors

The reauthorization act prioritizes caregiver support. For families or caregivers of deaf seniors, this could mean:

- Training and Resources: Programs tailored to caregivers supporting individuals with hearing loss, helping them navigate communication challenges and advocate effectively.
- Respite Care: Deaf-friendly respite
 care options where staff are trained to
 communicate with deaf individuals, ensuring
 continuity of care and cultural sensitivity.

Equity in Health and Wellness Programs

The act encourages programs to target underserved populations, including those with disabilities. For deaf seniors, this could mean:

- Community Outreach: Programs designed to educate deaf seniors about their rights, health resources, and available services.
- Accessible Preventive Care: Health screenings, mental health services, and chronic disease management programs made available with full communication access.

Advocacy and Representation

The increased focus on older adults with diverse needs creates opportunities for advocacy groups to push for better inclusion of deaf seniors. This could result in:

- Policy Development: Input from deaf advocacy groups in shaping program implementation.
- Data Collection: Improved demographic tracking of deaf seniors to ensure services meet their specific needs.

Challenges to Consider

While the proposed reauthorization offers promise, challenges remain, including:

- Implementation Gaps: Ensuring that increased funding translates into real accessibility improvements.
- Workforce Training: Scaling the availability of ASL interpreters and accessible service providers.

 Awareness: Educating service providers about the unique needs of deaf seniors.

Next Steps for Advocacy

Organizations and advocates for deaf seniors can help ensure that these opportunities are realized by:

- Engaging with policymakers to emphasize the importance of accessibility within OAA programs.
- Partnering with local aging organizations to develop culturally and linguistically appropriate resources for deaf seniors.
- Monitoring the reauthorization process to ensure that deaf seniors' needs are prioritized.

With the reauthorization, deaf seniors stand to benefit from expanded and improved services, but continued advocacy will be essential to ensure these changes are implemented effectively.



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
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
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A Celebration with Purpose: How One Retirement Party Raised \$2,000 for Deaf Seniors

Conference in Kansas City, Missouri in 2025, we want to introduce you to a wonderful program designed to make your travel experience even smoother.


Many of us experience hidden disabilities, like deafness, that can sometimes create challenges when navigating airports. To make your travel experience smoother and more enjoyable, we encourage you to participate in the Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Program.

What is the Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Program?

The Sunflower Program is a discreet way to let airport staff know that you may have a hidden disability, such as deafness and/ or other disabilities, that might require additional assistance. By wearing a Sunflower badge and lanyard, this simple Sunflower symbol lets the airport staff understand you're signaling to staff that you may need extra time, patience, or a helping hand during your journey.

Why Should You Participate?

- Enhanced Communication: Staff may be more aware of the need for visual cues or written communication.
- Reduced Stress: Knowing you have a way to discreetly signal your needs can alleviate travel anxiety.
- Smoother Experience: Staff may be able to offer assistance with directions, check-in, or boarding or whatever other need you may have.

Through my help with Visit Kansas City and the USA Sunflower Program Director, the Kansas City International Airport has recently joined the **Sunflower Program!** This means that airport staff will be trained to recognize the Sunflower symbol and offer assistance to travelers with hidden disabilities.

How to Get Involved

- Order Your Sunflower: Visit the Hidden **Disabilities Sunflower** website to order your personalized lanyard or badge: https:// hdsunflower.com/us/ personalized-deafcard.html
- Wear Your Sunflower Proudly: When you arrive at your hometown airport and when you arrive at the Kansas City Airport, the staff will be able to identify you and offer support as needed. Show the agent at the gate and show the stewardess when you get on the plane your Badge/Lanyard. It helps to make them aware of your needs.

By participating in the Sunflower Program, you are letting the airport staff know you might need some extra assistance and you're taking a proactive step to ensure a more comfortable and enjoyable travel experience. So, let's soar through the skies together!

Making a Gift to Your Grandchildren — Will It Be Taxable?

Before you plan to make a gift to your grandchildren, you may want to consult with a tax lawyer or a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) specializing in gift taxes. You should

ask whether you will need to pay taxes on the gift and how it will impact your financial picture.

Some questions you may want to ask yourself are whether you have the budget to make such a gift or whether it has been a part of your overall personal financial plan. There are two important factors you may want to keep in mind:

- (1) will it cause financial stress, and
- (2) will your financial security be affected.

Let's say you have a granddaughter and wish to give her \$10,000 as a gift. If you give her the gift, you do not need to report it to the Internal Revenue Service. For 2025, you can give a gift of up to \$19,000. And, if you are married,

Amount gifted	\$ 50,000
Annual Gift Tax Exemption	19,000
Amount to report to the IRS	\$ 31,000
Lifetime Gift Tax Exemption	\$ 13,990,000
Amount reported to IRS	31,000
Lifetime Gift Tax Exemption Remaining	\$ 13.959.000

you and your spouse can each give the same amount for a combined gift of up to \$38,000 without reporting it to the IRS. In addition, your granddaughter will not need to report the gift to the IRS. This is known as an Annual Gift Tax Exemption; you can gift up to the amounts annually.

There is also a Lifetime Gift Tax Exemption, which is \$13.99 million for 2025. How does this work? Suppose you gifted your granddaughter \$50,000.

If you use up the \$13.99 million, you will start to pay gift taxes.

There are other ways you can avoid paying gift taxes:

- Paying medical expenses
- Paying college tuition
- Superfunding a 529 plan
- Donating to 501(c)(3) charities

When it comes to medical expenses or college tuition, you don't need to be concerned about the exclusion as long as you pay directly to the health care provider or the college or university. So, if you gift \$75,000 to your granddaughter's university to cover her tuition, you will not be subject to the Annual Gift Tax Exclusion. This only applies to tuition, not books, supplies, or room and board.

As for medical expenses, the same principle applies as long as you transfer the funds to the hospital or medical center directly.

What happens if you pay indirectly, meaning you have the funds deposited into your granddaughter's checking account instead of sending the check to the college? Or,

for helping with the medical expenses, you deposit the funds into the individual's checking account instead of sending the check to the medical center? You will have to pay gift taxes.

In the example, granddaughter was used. It can be someone other than a family member.

The important key here is that the transfer of funds as a gift must be made directly to the university or college, and the

university or college, and the

medical center as mentioned above.

Superfunding a 529 plan is another way to help your grandchild with her college education. It is called Superfunding because the IRS code allows you to fund five years' worth of annual gifts once. How does this work? For example, let's say you decided to gift annually \$19,000 for 5 years (you have up to 5 years and up to \$19,000) to your granddaughter's 529 plan. This will total \$95,000. You

will not be taxed on the gift, but you will have to report it on your tax return and on Form 709, which is the United States Gift (and Generation-Skipping Transfer) Tax Return, you will need to check the box showing that you want the amount spread evenly over five years.

For those unaware of what a 529 plan is, it is a flexible, tax-advantaged investment

account
that helps
you pay for
your child's
education.

Lastly, you can gift to a 501(c) (3) tax-exempted nonprofit organization. Deaf Seniors of America is one such organization.

You can gift cash, securities, bonds, and real estate.
However, as mentioned at the beginning of this article, you should seek the advice of a tax attorney or CPA and evaluate your budget and long-term financial plan. If you have a Certified Financial Planner (CFP), the CFP can help you with the plan.

Yoga for Everyone: Embracing Wellness Through Deafhood Yoga

Deaf seniors can greatly benefit from incorporating yoga into their lives, especially when taught by a Deaf instructor fluent in American Sign Language (ASL) who understands the specific needs of the Deaf community. *Deafhood Yoga* offers a unique approach that merges the tools of Yoga with Deafhood principles, making it accessible and meaningful to Deaf Senior Citizens of America.

For over 15 years, *Deafhood Yoga* has provided classes online and in person, covering the Full Circle of Life—from pregnant mothers to children, young adults, adults, and our valued senior citizens. Every life stage holds unique importance, and yoga, when taught with a Deaf-centered perspective, supports us to embrace our humanity and live with greater awareness.

Understanding Deafhood and Yoga

Deafhood is a Deaf individual's personal and cultural journey, much like other life phases such as "childhood" or "motherhood." It celebrates the abundance of Deaf culture, sign language, and human experience, while canceling the negative, medicalized concept of "deafness." *Deafhood Yoga* embraces this sense of identity and community, recognizing that every Deaf individual has inherent value.

Yoga, from the Sanskrit word for "union," is an ancient practice of inner technology and science aimed at harmonizing the body, mind, and energy. While often seen in the West as merely physical exercise, yoga is more than that — it's a system for achieving one's highest potential.
